Legend:

Guan Yin is the Chinese name of an Indian Buddhist deity called Avalokitesvara. According to Indian Buddhist mythology, Avalokitesvara was born from a beam of light emanating from the eye of Buddha and is the all-compassionate aspect of the Buddha. Guan Yin, along with Buddhism, was introduced to China as early as the 1st century AD. Guan Yin is considered to be a Bodhisattva, a deity that has attained enlightenment worthy of nirvana but instead, remains in the human world to help others and end suffering. The translation of the name Guan Yin is he who perceives the sounds of the world, or the cries of those who need his help. Originally, Guan Yin was introduced as a male, but in Indian mythology, Guan Yin is non-gender. In Chinese mythology, Guan Yin is usually depicted as a woman wearing long white robes and wearing a crown with an image of Buddha in it.
